Dear Saints in Christ,

As we approach the 50th anniversary of the walkout of Concordia Seminary in St. Louis on February 19, 1974, I would like to take this time to reflect on some of the issues that are important to understand. Over the next couple of months will be a series addressing some of the issues which were occurring throughout Synod at the time. These will come by way of a theological abstract (a fancy word for summary). These were written for a historical theology class in the Doctor of Ministry Program at Concordia Theological Seminary. The first in the series is on the Nature of Scripture.

The Nature of Scripture

Why care about the Bible so much? Why is it so important to a congregation or to an individual? These questions have long been debated. These questions were asked many times by the faculty majority of Concordia Seminary in St. Louis in the 1970's.

There have been 2 approaches, essentially, in understanding the Bible. In one sense, there is a theological understanding, that God uses man. In the other sense there are those who view the Bible as purely a historical document.

Those in the faculty majority at Concordia Seminary approached Scripture using the latter approach. The faculty had embraced an approach called "rationalism" which has its roots in the 17th century. Rationalism places human reason over, and in many cases against, Scripture. This means that they boiled Scripture and the Gospel down to "what it means for the reader."

Scripture is clear as to what it is. St. Paul writes in his second letter to young pastor Timothy: *All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness* (2 Tm. 3.16). All of Scripture testifies to the reader that it is God's Holy Book. Inspiration comes from the Holy Trinity, not through the community of believers who determine what is true and what is not true.

Because the Bible is "breathed out" by God, there are consequences which follow. One of these consequences is that Scripture is infallible. Scripture has the inability to err or contradict itself. In other words, the Bible is a true unified whole, not a mere mashing together of the Old and New Testaments. It is important to understand that Scripture is infallible, not on account of human man, but rather because it comes *extra nos*, outside of oneself.

Scriptures are the written Word of God that have come directly from the Triune God. As a result, the Scriptures possess an infallibility that can only exist because God is the primary source of Scripture and the prophets and the apostles being the instrumental source. Attributes of Scripture such as inerrancy, inspiration, perennial truth, etc., are vitally important. They undergird the *authority of Scripture* for your faith and life and for the faith and life of the Christian Church. St. Augustine understood this as he dealt with heretics and false religions in his day. Martin Luther also understood this as he dealt with heretics, erring theologians, and the papacy. We still face such challenges today, even more so in the pluralistic and atheistic society in which we live and work.¹
